

Why I liked it:


This is the second book. I was intrigued to see what happened next. It's one of the darker dystopian series out there and because it starts in the 1990's, hits a lot closer to home.

Why I liked it:


The Apollo series is okay. It's not as good as the first two. I still love jumping into Riordan's universe-especially when there might be a Percy sighting.

Why I liked it:


My book club enjoys historical fiction. This one has a present day timeline and a historical one. It started as a sweet rom com and ended with a darker twist.

Pumpkin Julie Murphy


Why I liked it:

This One Summer Jillian Tamaki


Why I liked it: Summer isn't all fun & games. This graphic novel talks about the struggles parents face & how to find a way to navigate those struggles with them.



Hunting November Adriana Mather


Why I liked it: It's book two. Had to find out what was next.


Why I liked it: It was a supernatural historical fiction. Death was an interesting character.

to reading the sequel this summer.






Darius The Great Is Not Okay Adib Khorram

Why I liked it:






The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell Robert Dugoni


Why I loved it: This thriller is set in Northern Michigan! At times heartbreakingly sad, I was invested from beginning to end. There's a lot to talk about after reading this

Why I liked it:


We thought it would be dystopian, fits better as horror. If you liked *The Enemy*, you'll like this one.



Mr. Powell recommended this to me. It was an interesting look at current life in Africa and in the U.S. through the lens of basketball.




The Anthropocene Reviewed John Green

Why I liked it: An urban fantasy love story.




Illegal Eoin Colfer & Andrew Donkin

The Song of Achilles Madeline Miller


Why I loved it: Recommended to me by several students, it definitely lived up to the hype. A different perspective on the story of Achilles, beautifully written.

A Michigan memoir (it takes place in Dearborn) about finding and loving who you are. And she's really funny! You can find this one in our media center (that's how I found it!)






If You Come Softly

compiled.





Why I liked it:


HIstorical Fiction about life for a Chinese American in the South before World War I. Some really interesting perspectives I had not considered. Lots of takeaways.
